




School Discos





We know that the bar model is not the ONLY way of visualising a problem and we also know that these problems can be solved in the other ways.


DOJO REWARDS



Help your Bonfire Night go with a bang! (but a safe one)

At Northamptonshire Fire and Rescue Service and Northamptonshire Police, we would always say its best attend an organised fireworks display, but for those who are planning to use them at home, there are tips to remember to avoid accident or injury.

Using fireworks... some tips

Firstly, it sounds simple, but read the instructions on your fireworks. Light them at arm's length using a safety firework lighter or fuse wick. Everyone should stand well clear and never return to a lit firework. It's best to keep a bucket of water handy too. Fireworks should always be handled by adults.

Sparklers are not suitable for children under five. Light sparklers one at a time and wear gloves.

Last tip - It can be a frightening time for pets, so keep furry and non-furry companions safe indoors and be mindful of the effects on pets in your neighbourhood.

Fireworks: knowing the law

Unfortunately, people sometimes use this time of year to misuse fireworks. Fireworks may be beautiful to watch but they can also cause devastating injuries to people and damage to property if they are used in the wrong way. Never throw them or store them unsafely, such as in a pocket.

The laws state:

- You can't buy fireworks if you're under 18
- Fireworks cannot be set off between 11pm and 7am, except for Bonfire Night, when the cut off is midnight. On New Year's Eve, Diwali and Chinese New Year, the cut off is 1am
- You must not set off or throw fireworks (including sparklers) in the street or other public places
- You should only buy fireworks from registered dealers or licensed shops
- You can be fined an unlimited amount and imprisoned for up to six months for selling or using fireworks illegally. You could also get an on-the-spot fine of £90

Bonfires - the safe way

Fireworks may often be the main feature of a seasonal display, but bonfires are also a major attraction.

- Before lighting a bonfire, always check the structure is sound and there are no small children or animals hiding inside
- Position a bonfire away from sheds, fences and trees to avoid flames spreading
- Never use petrol or paraffin to light a fire. A safer way is to use paper and solid firelighters in two or three places to ensure an even burn
- Never burn dangerous rubbish such as foam-filled furniture, rubber, aerosols, tins of paint, pressurised gas cylinders, tyres and bottles
- Have one person responsible for lighting the fire. That person, and any helpers, should wear suitable clothing such as a substantial outer garment made of wool or other low flammable material and strong boots or shoes
- Never leave a bonfire unattended

We hope you found our safety tips interesting and that you remember them when you have your celebrations. From everyone at Northamptonshire Fire and Rescue and Northamptonshire Police, have a happy and safe Halloween and Bonfire Night.



Bonfire Night and Pets

Tips for Pets on Bonfire Night!



1. Keep Pets Indoors

Give pets extra exercise during the day and toilet breaks, but keep them in at night.

2. Drown Out The Noise

Play the radio or put the TV on a little bit louder to muffle firework noises.

3. Provide Hiding Spaces

Make a special place for pets to hide so they feel snug and secure.

4. Identification

Make sure your pet is wearing identification incase they run away or get lost.

5. Keep Pets Calm

Don't punish or fuss over your pet if they are scared. Just stay calm.

6. Flashing Lights.

Reduce firework flashes by closing the curtains and turning on indoor lights

Giant pumpkin weigh-offs

A pumpkin grown by Minnesota horticulture teacher, Travis Gienger, has smashed the previous record for the heaviest pumpkin grown in the U.S.A at the 49th Championship Pumpkin Weigh-Off in northern California. The weigh-off organisers tweeted, 'Two-time winner Travis Gienger 🍂 of Anoka MN is 2022 Pumpkin King! His 2560-pound Rhinoceros-sized Mega-Gourd set a new North American Record.' The massive squash took the title from New Yorker Scott Andrusz, who had weighed in his pumpkin at 2,554 pounds (1,158 kg) during The Great Pumpkin Farm fall festival, held earlier this month in Buffalo. The gigantic fruit broke the New York, US, and North American records as 'heaviest pumpkin'! The world record is still safe for now, continuing to be held by Stefano Cutrupi from Italy who grew a 2703-pound (1,226 kg) squash in 2021.

Ancient rock carvings unearthed

Impressive ancient rock carvings have been found in Iraq. Archaeologists at Mashki Gate, in northern Iraq, have unearthed stunning grey rock carvings that were made about 2,700 years ago. The excavation team, from Iraq's Mosul University and the United States' University of Pennsylvania, made the amazing discoveries whilst working to restore the Mashki Gate. The eight finely-made marble bas-relief carvings show finely chiselled

war scenes (including an Assyrian soldier pulling back an arrow, ready to fire), grape vines, and palm trees. Fadel Mohammed Khodr, head of the Iraqi archaeological team working at the site said, 'We believe that these carvings were moved from the palace of Sennacherib and reused by the grandson of the king to renovate the gate of Mashki and to enlarge the guard room. Only the part buried underground has retained its carvings.'

Marlo, a six-year-old Cavapoo from London, is very good at finding and collecting lost golf balls. A Cavapoo is a mixed breed dog (also called a Cavadoodle or a Cavoodle), a cross between the Cavalier King Charles Spaniel and Poodle dog breeds. The clever dog has retrieved over 6,000 with his owner Charles Jefferson! The pair collect the discarded balls whilst on walks together around various golf courses. They are now using Marlo's skills to help provide golf charities

with the balls they need to teach children around the world. The balls that Marlo has collected have been added to a donation drive by the DP World Tour, aimed at helping golfing charities and preventing golf ball littering. Their aim is to fill a 6-metre-long shipping container with second-hand tour-grade balls, to then send on to Kenya's Junior Golf Foundation, the South African Disabled Golf Association, the European Disabled Golf Association, the UAE's Chicks with Sticks, and India's Golf Foundation.

A robot named Ai-Da has become the first robot to speak in the House of Lords in Westminster, London.
